He has appeared at all levels of Court within British Columbia including the Court of Appeal, and has appeared in Courts throughout British Columbia.

#### **Judith Berg - Speaker Program Co-Chair**



#### Summary of the Annual General Meeting held on June 19, 2023

The Club's AGM was held at the beginning of the meeting, with the slate of Management Committee members (see the list at the end of the Newsletter) approved as well as the 2022-23 Financial Statement.

#### Working with Pacific Assistance Dogs – PADS speaker

The speaker for the meeting was Ms. Kim Gramlich, who attended with her dog Puma, a Victim Services Accredited Facility Dog with the Delta Policy Department. Also in attendance were Karen Dean who has provided the first 12 months of training for a new PADs dog, and Anika Electra, a dog sitter – who will take a training dog for a few weeks while the designated trainer takes time away for a vacation or a leave.

This program was pioneered in BC and runs currently in BC and Alberta. Many other jurisdictions are looking to set up similar programs. The BC/AB program has approximately 800 volunteers involved in all levels of training the dogs for their work as helpers for people with mobility challenges as well as individuals dealing with PTSD – particularly first responders, or veterans or people who are called as witnesses to court proceedings.

Dogs in training have yellow vests and are usually in the training period for approximately 18 months. When the dogs graduate they are given blue vests. Most of the dogs in PADS are Labs, Golden Retrievers or a mixture and PADS has a breeding program to ensure the best care of the dogs from the outset. Most dogs do graduate from the program but occasionally a dog's temperament is just not suited to a PADS role.

Kim stressed that the dogs really self-select the kind of work they will do by their temperament. Puma, she said, was ideal for Victim Services because he is very calm, relaxed – and wants nothing else than to be petted and loved. Other dogs have an innate interest in helping and are very active. Amazingly, Puma lay by Kim's side for the whole presentation and didn't move an inch.

#### Women's Probus Club – Coal Harbour Walking Tour – June 15, 2023

I have driven and walked through Coal Harbour many times as a born and raised Vancouverite, seeing the tall buildings and traffic congestion. However, after going on the Coal Harbour Guided Walking Tour with John Atkin, a knowledgeable civil engineer who worked in city planning, I now see Coal Harbour in a very different way. What we see now is a very thoughtful city planning process going back as far as 1917. Each city street would **forever** have a direct, unimpeded view to the water, whether running north/south or east/west. This picture is evidence of this early planning, even the Coal Harbour Marina is lined up with the city plan.

While there are lots of high rises, the resident buildings in the West End must be a minimum of 80 feet distance from the next high rise, with lower spaces filled in with lower-level townhouses, acting as a platform for the high towers. This also sets the tower back from the street level, which gives an impression more of a community of homes rather than high rises. Trees planted along the streets are to provide much needed shade in the summer to lower the heat levels in the buildings. Commercial towers do not have the same spacing requirements.



The City of Vancouver Coal Harbour area also has the most advance earthquake preparedness system of any city in the world. One of the major results of an earthquake are fires, from broken gas lines, but at the same time the water lines will also be damaged. Underground in Coal Harbour, there are a number of old train tunnels, that are now used to house extensive highly protected water piping and pumping systems. The pumps run on diesel from huge storage tanks underground and can pump sea water from Coal Harbour to special water stations marked in blue and white throughout the downtown area to fight fires due to earthquakes.

In more recent planning, as Coal Harbour waterfront industry left and was replaced with condos, a sea walk was put in to join up with Stanley Park. By design, the City planners did not want a lot of commercial activity along the sea walk, keeping it to a minimum for a more tranquil experience. City planners from all over the world come to Vancouver to see and learn from the forethought over a century that has resulted in this amazing beautiful area.
