Meeting at West Vancouver Yacht Club

Monday, 18th March, 2024, at 10:00 with refreshments at 9:15 am Max Wyman and Ken McQueen in conversation: "Can Art Build us a Better World?"

As we mentioned in earlier newsletter, due to major construction underway at the West Vancouver High School for the new track and field facilities until the winter of 2025, the parking lots are now closed during the daytime for the foreseeable future. The Spring speakers sessions of our Probus Club have therefore been relocated to the West Vancouver Yacht Club.

The monthly meeting dates will remain the same except for the May meeting which will be held on Tuesday 21st May. The meeting costs including room rental and refreshments are similar to those at Kay Meek, so there should be no change to our budgets. We will continue meetings at WVYC through to June and reconsider venue options going into next year, and with the potential of returning to Kay Meek when parking is available again.

Parking is available at the WVYC. There is parking in front of the club house and just to the west of the sailing school smaller building. There is also lots of parking at Thunderbird Marina, east of the Yacht club, but it is a bit of a walk along Marine Drive and no sidewalk. There is also a smaller parking lot at the marina just west of the yacht club, shorter walk along Marine Drive, again no sidewalks. We encourage members to carpool. Another alternative is the West Vancouver Blue 250 bus which stops right outside the WVYC. Travelling by car on the Upper Levels Highway, take Exit 2, Eagleridge Drive down to Marine Drive, turn left on Marine Drive to the Yacht Club.



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

Monday March 18th Speakers Max Wyman and Ken MacQueen in conversation

MAX WYMAN is a Vancouver writer and cultural commentator. Born and educated in England, he spent several years as a journalist in London before emigrating to Canada in 1967. He was dance, music and drama critic for *The Vancouver Sun* and CBC Radio for over 30 years.

He was for six years a member of the board of the Canada Council for the Arts, he served as Mayor of the Village of Lions Bay from 2005 to 2008, and was founding chair of the Metro Vancouver Regional Cultural Committee.



Max has consulted on arts policy for the federal government and the governments of Alberta and British Columbia, and has lectured on arts policy across North America.



KEN MACQUEEN, as an Ottawa-based journalist, covered elections, leaderships, scandals and the 1995 Quebec referendum. After his move to Vancouver, he worked first with the Vancouver Sun/Southam News, and later as Vancouver Bureau Chief for Maclean's, indulging his wildly unfocused range of interests.

With the fun, and funds, draining out of journalism, Ken left Maclean's after 15 years and turned to writing fiction. He has two unpublished Canadian-based thrillers ripening on his hard drive. *Hero Haters*, his debut thriller based in the U.S. Pacific Northwest, was published in October 2022.

As Max so eloquently argued in a recent essay: "it's hard to show the value of art and culture on a cost-benefit graph." MacQueen's personal graph certainly shows he writes for love, not for money.

Summary of Hilary Letwin's talk on Tuesday 20th February, 2024

Dr. Hilary Letwin, Administrator/Curator, West Vancouver Art Museum Genius Loci: An Introduction to the Landscape Architecture of Cornelia Hahn Oberlander.

It was a pleasure to have Dr. Hilary Letwin as a speaker for our Probus Club again. Her presentation about the life and work of Cornelia Hahn Oberlander was a full introduction to the work of this amazing Canadian landscape architect, and a glimpse at the elements of her background and life which had such a profound impact on her work and view of the world.

Born in Germany before the start of the Second World War, Cornelia's widowed mother, Beate Hahn, fled the country of her birth with her daughters to England and then to the US where Cornelia took her undergraduate work at Smith College. Peter Oberlander, also Jewish and also born in Germany, moved with his family to England just before the war, but Peter at age 18, was caught up in the wartime distrust of foreigners (principally Germans), and was interned as a possible enemy alien, and imprisoned as a prisoner of war, first in the UK and later in Canada. Following the end of the war, Cornelia and Peter met at Harvard where they were both graduate students.

Hilary's presentation featured the main foci in Cornelia's work: designing landscapes in conjunction with architects, and using innovative planting and environmentally appropriate plant selection processes in playgrounds and social housing projects, private gardens, and landscaping for public institutions. Cornelia was possibly influenced by her mother's background as a botanist and advocate for kindergartens (children's gardens), and she enhanced on these theories by developing wild play areas that included elements of risk and discovery for children.

Among Cornelia's most impressive works are the landscaping surrounding the Law Courts in Robson Square, Vancouver, the Children's Centre at the Canadian Pavilion at Expo 67, the roof garden at the Vancouver Public Library, the Canadian Chancery in Washington, DC and the Northwest Territories Legislative Assembly in Yellowknife. Probus members who would like more information about Cornelia can consult Susan Herrington's excellent book: Cornelia Hahn Oberlander: Making the Modern Landscape 2014. Cornelia Hahn Oberlander died in Vancouver in 2021 at the age of 99.

In 2021, the Art Gallery of Alberta and the West Vancouver Art Museum co-presented the exhibition entitled *Genius Loci: An introduction to the Landscape Architecture of Cornelia Hahn Oberlander.* The Exhibition was mounted in Alberta, North Vancouver and several other cities.
