Annual General Meeting and Speaker – Dr. Paul Evans, Professor Emeritus, UBC: China Revisited

Paul Evans recently retired from UBC. Paul is the Director Emeritus of the Institute of Asian Research. He is a specialist of Asian and trans-Pacific international relations. His most recent book is entitled Engaging China: Myth, Aspiration and Strategy in Canadian Policy from Trudeau to Harper. Earlier, he directed research centres and programs at the University of Toronto and York University, Harvard, and UBC as well as served as Co-CEO of the Asia Pacific Foundation of Canada. A frequent visitor to Hong Kong, he also taught courses in the Department of Political Science and Public Administration at the University of Hong Kong in 2012 and 2013.

His recent writings and media commentaries have focused on Canada-China relations, Asian security dynamics, and the emergence of technonationalism as a defining force in regional affairs.



<u>West Vancouver Art Museum – Arthur Erickson</u> <u>Centennial Exhibit</u> Wednesday, May 15th, 2024

Tour and Talk – W.V. Art Museum – Arthur Erickson

We had 15 members attend the tour and talk by Hilary Letwin, Curator of the West Vancouver Arts Museum on Arthur Erickson. The exhibit gave insight into the renowned architect's private residence. In 1957, he bought a Shaughnessy property with a garage and overgrown garden and transformed it into a unique style of modernism.

The converted garage became his house at 680 sq ft which contrasted with his public monumental projects like Robson Square, Simon Fraser University and the Museum of Anthropology. The gallery exhibit portrayed the home with enlarged photos of the spaces, a 3D model and a replicated living room with the Gordon Smith painting given to him by Gordon, his collection of books and personal treasures.



The original overgrown garden became a large pond with landscape contouring including a large berm and lots of trees to give privacy. This became Arthur's refuge and decompression chamber. Thanks to Inga Harding for organizing this event.

May Speaker - Leslie Howard - Tuesday May 21st, 2024 10:00 am WVYC

Leslie Howard explained the fascinating process that she used to write her two historical fiction novels - The Brideship Wife and her latest book -The Celestial Wife.

She feels that writing improves with age...a lifetime of using words becomes muscle memory. Leslie had written non-fiction articles published in newspapers, websites and trade journals as part of her career in finance. She wrote her historical fiction novels after retiring.

The key to writing historical fiction, non-fiction or a memoir, begins with research. Museums, field trips, online searches and interviewing locals are resources that she used to add details to support the story. For example in her latest novel she interviewed locals in the Okanagan, visited Bountiful and read accounts of polygamy.

Leslie read a Greek Fable to illustrate the structure of the novel. She walked us through a comparison of Pygmalion and My Fair Lady following her outline.

This is the handout from Leslie about structuring her writing.

The structure of the novel

- At the start of the novel, the hero (or main character) is fine where he/she is
 in life and does not want to make any changes. Here, the writer creates a
 scene that demonstrates the status quo.
- 2. An event happens to upset the hero's world and there is a call to action which she resists.
- An incident occurs (the Inciting Incident) that the hero cannot ignore, and she is launched on her journey and is often egged on by another character.
- 4. Events follow that are referred to as rising action and they culminate in a major event often called Plot Point One. At this juncture, there is no turning back for the hero.
- 5. At the middle of the novel, the hero begins to see herself differently as a result of the transformation she has experienced to that point in the novel.
- 6. Plot Point Two involves an incident or development that marks the beginning of the resolution of the novel.
- 7. The climax is the point in the novel where the action and stakes are at their peek.
- 8. The final resolution allows the writer to show the reader how much the hero has been transformed and to describe how the hero will move forward for the rest of her life.
